John Calvin turns 500—part two

Trained both as a lawyer and a minister, Calvin had a strong desire to help people understand their faith in a systematic and structured way. From 1536 until 1559, he wrote and continually revised his “Institutes of the Christian Religion.” This major writing sparked discussion and debate for decades and still forms the basis of the reformed faith of our time.

Calvin divided his work into four parts, roughly following the form of the Apostle’s Creed. His first book dealt with the knowledge of God the Creator. Calvin maintained that knowledge about God is evident in nature and that since God’s glory is so clearly visible to all that no one can claim ignorance of God. Beyond that first step, Calvin wrote that we need Scripture to better understand God and our relationship to the Creator.

Scripture guides us in our search for knowledge and a proper lifestyle, reflecting our faith. Like others of his time, Calvin wanted the Bible to be translated into the everyday languages of the people. For Calvin, that language was French but he appreciated the need for the Bible to be written in all the major languages of Europe at the time. Calvin was not a literalist. He believed that the Bible came inspired from God, but had a number of different ways in which it could be interpreted. That ambiguity made worship and Bible study very important, in order that we might help each other along our faith paths.

Calvin’s second book addressed our knowledge of God the Redeemer in Christ. He wrote that all humanity is sinful, from the very first sin of Adam and Eve. We are incapable of saving ourselves. No matter how hard we might try, we will always fall short of the perfection that belongs to God. Because of that, we needed help getting back into a right relationship with God and so it was necessary for God to send his Son as a mediator between us and God.

Calvin argued that the Jewish people of the Old Testament received the same message and that there is a great deal of similarity in the purposes of the two testaments. The Law, Calvin argued, was less important as a judgment against people and more important as a guide for living and a hope of salvation that would come in Christ. As part of his second book, Calvin included a major section dealing with the Ten Commandments.

Calvin’s third book dealt with the Holy Spirit and the grace that we continue to receive as we grow in faith. The Holy Spirit is very important in guiding us and in convincing us of our need to continually repent and grow. Calvin used the term regeneration to describe how we gradually make our way toward the kingdom, even though we are surrounded by a sinful world and inevitably fall back into sin ourselves. It is in this section that Calvin wrote more fully about Paul’s idea of predestination. To Calvin, this doctrine was a sign of hope that in the midst of sin, God would pluck out and save some of the people who would otherwise surely perish for eternity.

Calvin’s final book of the Institutes lays out his view of the church and its role in guiding and shaping our faith. Remembering that there was a great struggle going on between the established Roman Catholic Church and the new reformers, Calvin discussed the ways in which we properly worship, administer the sacraments, organize congregations, choose leaders and relate to the world outside the church. This section of his writings grew the most over the years, as Calvin wrote and argued with church leaders from a variety of backgrounds. Some were supportive and some were quite critical. It was a time when disagreement over church matters could lead to prison or execution. We continue to benefit from Calvin’s intelligence, courage, perseverance and love of God.

Spring Work Trip

Houma, Louisiana, was in the path of Hurricane Ike and will be the site of our spring work trip, March 8-14. Houma, about an hour southwest of New Orleans, is in the heart of Cajun country and our group will be learning more about the culture as we help to rebuild a number of family homes. We will be staying at a Presbyterian Disaster Assistance relief camp, which was nearly destroyed by the hurricane and had to be rebuilt before work camp teams could return to the area. The camp is now well equipped to accommodate our needs.

Our team consists of 15 members, pretty evenly split between college students and 'older' adults. We have a few team members with moderate experience in rebuilding. The others will learn quickly and we will all be guided by on-site supervisors. While we are working, there will also be other teams from a variety of places around the country, including New Jersey and California, probably about 100 workers in all. Please keep all the team members in your prayers as we continue our planning and make the trip to Houma and back. Of course, financial support is always welcome as we will buy the supplies necessary for our work and provide for our own meals and transportation during the week.
